We continue to partner with our stakeholders such as DeKalb County government and elected officials, cities, Community Improvement Districts (CIDs), education and workforce providers, and economic development organizations such as the Georgia Department of Economic Development (GDEcD), the Metro Atlanta Chamber, Georgia Power, Georgia EMC and Electric Cities of Georgia. Cultivating the relationships between DeKalb businesses, Decide DeKalb and our stakeholders helps solve challenges facing companies today.

B R E P R O G R A M 2 0 2 1

In 2021, Decide DeKalb engaged 68 businesses across several industries. The Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) signed in 2021 between Decide DeKalb and DeKalb County outlines a 10% increase in BRE visits annually for the 5-year duration of the IGA.

The "**Commercial**" and "**other**" categories include DeKalb businesses and non-profits which received a grant and loan from the DeKalb County Small Business Relief Fund. This program provided a grantor loan to businesses negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. It was launched in August 2020 and was funded by a partnership between the Community Foundation of Greater Atlanta, United Way of Greater Atlanta, and Advance DeKalb. The Fund targeted businesses which have fewer than 50 employees and are located in a distressed census tract. The program was administered by LISC and \$178,000 in funds were awarded in January 2021 to 16 DeKalb businesses.

INTERNATIONAL PAPER

For 35 years, International Paper has had a facility in Tucker. Decide DeKalb visited International Paper alongside our partners from GDEcD, Georgia Power's Economic and Community Development team, the City of Tucker, the Metro Atlanta Chamber, and other key stakeholders. The team provided helpful information. In turn, Georgia Power provided workforce data so the company can benchmark salaries, identify workforce which may have transferable skills, and guide their partnerships with Georgia Piedmont Technical College and WorkSource DeKalb. The group was also able to tour the facility.

U.S. TENNIS ASSOCIATION (USTA) IN DEKALB

Peter Bau and Nazar Bilukhaare are leading the charge on redeveloping the tennis court facility on Presidential Drive. The courts have been through tornado damage and multiple foreclosures. Peter and Nazar are bringing the courts up to speed and partnering with the U.S. Tennis Association. Through events and revenue-generating activities with USTA, the state-of-the-art facility will help revitalize this area and increase community engagement. Decide DeKalb helped them navigate the permit process and connected them with Discover DeKalb.



BRE FINDINGS

In 2021, the main restriction to growth, identified by DeKalb businesses and organizations, was and continues to be the workforce shortage.

- MACHINISTS AND INDUSTRIAL MECHANICS continue to be in high demand, especially as manufacturing operations become more sophisticated and technologically advanced.
- The SERVICE INDUSTRY WORKFORCE is extremely sought after, while shortages in commercial business remain constant.
- COMMERCIAL KITCHEN SPACE is very popular, as consumers move more toward take-out and food-delivery services, and small, local food concepts.
- The ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY is rapidly expanding in DeKalb, with the redevelopment of Assembly and Pullman Yards, and industry leaders expect this trend to continue.
- **TECH COMPANIES** such as Hermeus and ServeScape are able to recruit employees by touting the benefits of the high quality of life in DeKalb county, and the proximity to skilled talent in DeKalb, City of Atlanta, Gwinnett County and beyond.

WORKFORCE INITIATIVES

As we found in our company visits, the availability of workforce is the top priority for DeKalb organizations. To help address the issues, Decide DeKalb kicked off the inaugural MADE IN DEKALB Educator Fellowship for the 2021-2022 school year, in partnership with DeKalb County School District. MADE connected DeKalb public educators with DeKalb companies and demonstrated different career pathways into local skilled trades. By integrating industry into instruction at elementary to high school levels, educators gained awareness about well-paying jobs in modern facilities.

The cohort of 10 educators met with local businesses, job shadowed employees, heard from industry leaders, and used their expertise as educators to effectively bring industry insight to their students.
